The Keep Oconee County Beautiful Commission has several recycling and beautification opportunities available in the coming weeks:

Community Shred Day

Drive-Thru - the next free shred day will take place Friday, October 21, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Oconee Veterans Park rain or shine; all shredded paper will be recycled.



Trick or Treat Trail and Trick or Treat on Main - bring the kids to visit KOCBC on the Trick or Treat Trail at Oconee Veterans Park on Wednesday, October 26, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m., or at the Trick or Treat event on Main Street in Watkinsville on Monday, October 31, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m., and recycle those candy wrappers!

Tire and Battery Amnesty - throughout the entire month of October, Oconee County residents may bring up to four tires per vehicle to any one of the county's five Recycling/Waste Convenience Centers on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Only tires from cars and light trucks will be accepted, and tires must not be on rims. Auto and boat batteries will also be accepted for recycling with no limits on quantity. Both tires and batteries collected as part of this event will be recycled.

Notes from IT

Look Out for Smishing

Smishing is a close cousin to Phishing. This alternative social engineering technique uses text messages to entice people to click links, much like Phishing does through emails. However, because people generally interact differently with text messages than they do emails, there is a different skill set needed for safeguarding your data.

Schedule reminders, transaction confirmations, and bank alerts are common text messages people legitimately receive every day. Because of this, they are the perfect camouflage for a fraudulent text message.



As usual, the first line of defense is common sense – does it even make sense for you to be receiving a text message from this source about this topic? If the answer is no, you should be immediately on guard.

Spelling mistakes, just like in phishing emails, are also an indicator that the text may not be genuine. The phone number sending the text can be a clue. Large businesses, especially financial institutions, are more likely to send text messages from a short code number, for example 5 digits. If you receive what looks like an automated text from a business that comes from a normal phone number, then it could be an indicator of a fraudulent text.

Since it is easier to obscure link URLs in text messages, they are not a great indicator of fraudulent texts.


Tapping a link in one of these fraudulent text messages is nearly the same thing as following a link in a phishing email. Much like phishing links, these links can take you to fraudulent websites which request personal information. They may even try to force malware onto your device.
